Sharpshooters Down Under

Last September, the 4 Cdn Div PRes Shooting Team had earned themselves an invitation at the Australian Army Skill at Arms Meeting (AASAM) by winning the Soldier's Cup at the CAF Small Arms Concentration (CAFSAC). Although a few modifications were made to the original team for AASAM, the CAF Combat Shooting Team (CAFCST) consisted of 15 CAF reservists from across the country:

- Rifleman Cpl Valcour, GGFG
- Rifleman Cpl Fortin, GGFG
- Rifleman Cpl Bertrand, GGFG
- Rifleman Cpl Ferguson, 1st Nova Scotia Highlanders
- Rifleman Cpl Hordo, Queen's Own Rifles
- Pistol/Gunner CSgt Dallaire, GGFG
- Pistol/Gunner Sgt Lavoie, Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders
- Pistol/Gunner Cpl Muldoon, GGFG
- Pistol/Gunner Cpl Wong, Queen's Own Rifles



With only 4 days worth of pre-competition shooting with our star coach and very own 2 times Queen's Medallist Capt Sean Gagnon, the team was able to shake out the rust and get mentally prepared for competition.

Flying to Melbourne Australia was a 30 hour journey through 4 flights, crossing the international date line resulting in a skipped calendar day and a 14 hour time difference from home. Our destination was the Puckapunyal Military Area an hour and a half North of Melbourne. The ADF were very organized and more than welcoming; all we had to do is what we do best: shoot. The CAFCST used Australian weapons and ammo for AASAM: Colt M4 carbines, 9mm Browning Mark 3 and the FN Minimi LSW. With little difference in weapons platform and our own C79 sights, the team was able to compete with something familiar.

The team's average routine was reveille at 0515 to be at the ranges NLT 0700. We would carry out a specific pre-match routine of serial memorization, practice, visualization and hours of dry firing. Competitors were given a specific time slot to complete each match. Most days would see the team spend a complete day at the ranges with an occasional night shoot. The CAFCST was mainly split into 2 competition groups as detailed above: 8 riflemen and 4 pistol and machine gunners. This ensured each could specialize and concentrate on specific matches. The Puckapunyal facility had 3 mechanical target ranges that helped save the competition a great deal of time by quickly streamlining multiple serials of shooters within only a few hours as opposed to days on a conventional range. Their weapons simulator, similar to our SATS, was also used to run a very fast match.

Here are some of the competition specs:

AASAM had 32 Australian teams and 16 international teams:

Canada, Indonesia, Philippines, Australia – International, New Zealand, Brunei, United Kingdom, Japan, United States – Marine Corps, United States – Army, Singapore, France – French

Forces New Caledonia, Papua New Guinea, Thailand, Timor-Leste, Tonga.

More than half these teams were professional shooting teams who concentrate on shooting competitions.

The CAFCST competed in over 32 matches.

The team earned 3 Silvers and 1 bronze:

- Match 6: 400m Deliberate Cpl Ed Ferguson
- Match 15: Applied Marksmanship Practice MCpl Ash, MCpl Ryan, Cpl Valcour, Cpl Fortin, Cpl Bertrand, Cpl Ferguson, Cpl Hordo, Lt Rogal.
- Match 61: Military Biathlon CSgt Dallaire
- Match 53: Section Match Team Assault/Defense – CSgt Dallaire, MCpl Ryan, Cpl Fortin, Cpl Valcour, Cpl Hordo, Cpl Muldoon, Cpl Bertrand, Cpl Ferguson.



Overall, the Indonesians came out on top with the Canadians mainly around 5th place demonstrating to be a stronger team with a higher medal count than last year's CAFCST. Although AASAM was no place to learn new things, all team members had a valuable professional development

experience that will undoubtedly change the way they shoot in the future and how future teams can better ready themselves for competitions.

The highlight of AASAM was the international networking, friendships and exchanges between teams. That experience was reinforced during the international weapons familiarization and during the final international dinner. Every member of the CAFCST had a bottle of pure Canadian maple syrup which was offered as a gift of recognition and appreciation to members of international and Australian teams as well as the organizers.
